Minors

A minor is a collection of courses specified by the school in which the minor is housed. For example, you may wish to take all your electives in Political Science in which case you could "declare" Political Science as your minor. The courses required for that minor would appear on your DegreeWorks audit so that you can incorporate them into your four-year plan of study.

General Electives

General electives are classes outside of your major that you choose. They are in addition to courses required to satisfy your major, core, or other areas. Electives are used to fill out your degree and help provide direction and distinction to your transcript. You should select elective courses based on your interests, skills, desire for more in-depth study, and to explore areas for potential employment. For example, electives in fashion, advertising, communication, criminal justice, psychology, cyber security, etc. can support your interest in those industries and provide you with insight into a career path. It's a good idea to start incorporating electives into your plan earlier, rather than later, so that you can build on your knowledge and have time to diversify your interests into other areas over the course of your academic career. The number of electives you need varies by program, Pathway, prior coursework, and other factors.

Students are urged to create a draft plan of study to determine the best strategy to maximize the number of elective courses they get to choose. Electives can be taken in many different subject areas or all in one specific area.
